Executive Report

WE'RE PLEASED TO UPDATE YOU on the health and operations of your member-owned electric distribution business, Valley Rural Electric Cooperative (REC). As it has for 85 years, Valley REC continues to keep safe, affordable, and reliable electric service flowing to member homes, farms, businesses, hunting camps, and churches throughout our eight-county service area.

Your cooperative is on solid financial footing and experienced another good year in 2023. Equity was at 51% of assets at the end of 2023, which is in line with our equity management plan. We returned nearly \$2.3 million in patronage capital to eligible members and former members in December 2023, which follows the December 2022 return of \$2.7 million, our largest ever. Over the years, we have returned nearly \$39 million in patronage capital.

As usual, the co-op's largest outlay in 2023 was to Allegheny Electric Cooperative, Inc., our wholesale energy supplier, for the purchase of electricity. The co-op spent more than \$22.3 million on energy last year, about 51% of the 2023 budget. Due to the extremely high cost of natural gas and rising costs of industry materials, the board of directors approved, in late 2022, an increase in the co-op's kilowatt-hour (kWh) rate and basic monthly charge. The increase of 1.5 cents per kWh, to 11.45 cents, was effective January 2023.

Additionally, the basic monthly charge for all classes increased by \$2 per month. These rates were unchanged going into 2024, and the board is hopeful these rates will remain unchanged in 2025. Even with the adjustment, rates for Valley REC residential accounts are more than 30% lower than those of neighboring private power companies.

Valley REC, its 12 sister cooperatives in Pennsylvania and one in New Jersey are in the fortunate position of owning approximately 66% of our energy supply. The remaining 34% must be purchased on the open market where prices are much more volatile. We continue to ask our members to lend a hand in stabilizing future wholesale power costs by shifting summertime use to early mornings and evenings and participating in our demand response program. If you're already enrolled in the program, thank you. If not, please consider joining this important load management effort.

Valley REC continues to focus on improving system reliability and power quality. This year, we are replacing the 1950s-era Three Springs substation in Cromwell Township, Huntingdon County, with a new substation at the same location. This project is the fourth substation upgrade on our system since 2020.

In 2023, Valley REC energized its new Sinking Valley substation in a new location, which is about a half mile from the former Blair County site. The co-op energized a new Atkinson Mills substation in Mifflin County in November 2021 on the site of the former facility and built the new Path Valley substation in Peters Township, Franklin County, in 2020.

We are also continuing to install automated switching devices that limit the number of members impacted by any one outage event. And we are continuing our aggressive approach to vegetation management to lessen the likelihood of tree-related outages.

Valley REC is dedicated to providing safe, affordable and reliable power to our consumers while improving the quality of life in the region we serve. As always, we invite you to contact the co-op offices with any questions or concerns you have about your business.



Valley REC's 2024 Drive-thru Annual Meeting Draws More Than 1,700 Members to Huntingdon Fairgrounds

VALLEY RURAL ELECTRIC COOPERATIVE (REC) members re-elected three incumbents to the co-op's nine-member board of directors during the business's annual meeting April 5. The drivethru meeting, held at the Huntingdon County Fairgrounds, drew 1,755 memberships.

Members elect directors to three-year terms, and three seats are open for election each year. Jim Stauffer, board chairman, will continue to serve as the director from District 2. Joanne Whitsel was reelected to the District 4 seat, and Leroy Barnes, board vice chairman, remains in the District 6 seat. Also on the ballot were James Palmer, District 4; and Dennis Straver, District 6.

Like many cooperatives, Valley REC had for many years held its annual meeting at a high school auditorium. The COVID-19 pandemic forced co-ops to find other formats for their member meetings, with some moving to a drive-thru format and others adopting a web-based meeting. Valley REC moved to its drivethru format in 2021 following the cancellation of the 2020 annual meeting.

"We initially switched to this format to provide a COVID-19-safe way to host our annual meeting," Valley REC President & CEO Rich Bauer says. "We had an overwhelmingly positive response to the first drive-thru event and discovered that many more of our members are able to participate this way."

Following COVID-19, the co-op returned to its traditional firehall-dinner format for the three district

nominating meetings held each February. Members attending those meetings nominate members in good standing whose names then appear on the annual meeting ballot to be voted upon by the membership at large.

The co-op's corporate headquarters is across the road from the fairgrounds. Nearly all co-op employees were on hand to direct traffic, register members, and hand out ballots and gifts. Members who attended will receive a \$25 bill credit.
